


Installing a top rope at the belay anchor






Technique: giving slack








For a dynamic belay, do a small jump or take a step forward to reduce the impact force on the climber







The most common clipping techniques (other techniques exist)









Rope behind leg









LEAD CLIMBING

Inspection points


You must be trained and accredited before using an auto belay system

Visual inspection


- Connector connected to the harness attachment point
